### PELHAM WINS OPENING GAME

**Memorial High, outweighing Bronxville Opponents, scores two touchdowns**

On Saturday, October 11, the Memorial High football team, playing on its home field, trounced Bronxville High to the tune of 14-0. Since it was the first game of the season for the Pelham boys, the bleachers were well filled by home rooters, who vied with the opposing rooters across the field in their efforts to keep up the morale of their respective teams. Lynch, Flanagan, R. Mann, Griffin, and G. Dillon starred for the home team, while the shining lights of the Bronxville eleven were Holston, quarterback, and Abbot, left tackle.

Pelham won the toss and started the action with terrific line-bucking by Lynch, who seemed able to gain four or five yards whenever called upon. The Bronxville team seemed to depend a great deal on the punting of Holston, who, however, did not get his kicks off very well in the first period. Pelham lost the ball twice to Bronxville, but finally received it again on a punt and advanced it steadily to the 20-yard line before the whistle blew ending the period.

At the beginning of the second quarter Mann was substituted for Cremens at left-half and Campello for Dillon at quarter. In the first two minutes a touchdown was scored on a beautiful pass from Griffin to Flanagan, who twisted and dodged over the line for the first tally. Flanagan then kicked goal, bringing the score to 7-0. Pelham kicked, and Bronxville not being able to gain, Holston kicked over Griffin's head. "Gil" finally picked up the pigskin and ran it back ten or fifteen yards. A long gain off left tackle by D. Mann and a steady advance toward Bronxville's goal brought the ball down to the 4-yard line, where Lynch took it over for another touchdown. Flanagan again kicked goal, just before the half ended.

At the beginning of the third quarter, the entire second team was substituted for the first. The left side of the second team line opened up holes very well, but the backs seemed unable to gain through the right side. Barker proved to be the best gainer of the second team, although the eleven as a whole did exceedingly
